Ray Acheson is the Director of Reaching Critical Will, the disarmament program of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom. Ray represents WILPF on the International Steering Group of the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN), which won the 2017 Nobel Peace Prize. Ray also works to prevent the development of fully autonomous weapons; to end the use of explosive weapons in populated areas; to challenge the international arms trade and war profiteering; and to bring feminist analysis to weapons and war. They are currently a Visiting Research Collaborator at Princeton University's Program on Science on Global Security and recently published a book about the nuclear ban and antinuclear activism, *Banning the Bomb, Smashing the Patriarchy* (Rowman and Littlefield, 2021).

Sharon Dolev is the founder and director of the Israeli Disarmament Movement, which represents ICAN in Israel, and of the *METO Project* for a WMD free zone in the Middle East. In recent years, she presented a radio show called 'according to foreign sources'. She has been a social and political activist since 1985 and has been active in Women in Black and the "Gaza Team" which petitioned Israeli authorities on human rights violations in the Gaza Strip. Sharon is a past coordinator of the Meretz Party's Civil and Human Rights group and published "Watch Dogs" a pro-peace Hebrew-Arabic magazine, that later became a radio program with the same name and followed the state of democracy in Israel. In recent years, Sharon worked as a disarmament campaigner and as the Director of Greenpeace in Israel.

Janet Fenton, a Quaker feminist, addresses the planetary crisis with creative non-violence through theatre arts, media and campaigning. Janet is the former coordinator of Peace & Justice Centre Scotland and facilitated Scotland's for Peace toward enhancing the peace agenda in the Scottish Parliament. Janet is currently the Secure Scotland Organiser; a WILPF Scotland Parliament Liaison; the Vice Chair of the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament; and the Scottish Parliament Disarmament Cross Party Group Secretary.

Prerna Gupta is currently pursuing a Ph.D. at the Institute of Resources, Environment, and Sustainability at the University of British Columbia, Vancouver. Her research focuses on the social impacts and risk perceptions of nuclear energy in India. She has been associated with various social movements in India, including the Coalition for Nuclear Disarmament and Peace. Her master's thesis "Normalizing Nuclear: A cultural study of how India learned to love the bomb" was completed at the Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai.

YouKyoung Ko is a consultant with the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom for the women-led Korea Peace Now Campaign. She is based in Seoul. She is the former executive director of the National Campaign for Eradication of Crimes by US Troops in Korea, and an expert for years of experience of impacts of US-ROK alliance and US Forces' military presence in Korea.

Hans M. Kristensen is Director of the Nuclear Information Project at the Federation of American Scientists (FAS) in Washington, D.C., where he is responsible for researching and documenting the status and operations of nuclear forces of the nine nuclear-armed states.
